TETRA PAK PROJECT

'Plastic' is a serious global challenge faced by the world because people often don't know how to dispose of plastics correctly. Our school has taken up a project to recycle plastic and tetra paks and contribute to mitigate this problem.

These benches are subsequently donated to schools in villages. Last year, we collected 8000+ tetra paks and donated 10 recycled school benches to a school for the underprivileged.






